Supporting Each Other's Success

What if they made square tables with only three legs? Where would you want to set down your cup of freshly brewed hot coffee? The table might look stable, but put pressure anywhere near the corner that has no supporting leg and look out!

But they do make square tables with four supporting legs. The weight of the table is spread out, with each leg supporting only a quarter of the total weight of the table. Even if you set a stack of books on one corner, the weight will be distributed to all four legs.

In Toastmasters, tables are very important to us. When we meet, we gather around tables to commence communication. The table supports our learning and our comfort level. Without the tables, we are people standing around waiting. We want to come together and get on with the business of learning better public speaking and the art of navigating group dynamics. Tables allow us to gather and be productive together.

Think of Toastmaster clubs as tables for a moment. The unseen legs are like the people who help support the club and its activities, each in their own way and to varying degrees of support. Without individuals in

The Successful Club Series has a "Keeping the Commitment" presentation. It refers to how we, as Toastmasters, support our Clubs and our fellow members. The presentation breaks the Toastmaster's Promise (see chart on page 5) into three parts: participation, fellowship, and responsibility to the Club.

It's a fun module, and it's especially useful in Clubs that need a shot in the arm. I heartily recommend it. But it raises a question to consider: how we keep the commitment to ourselves.

Regardless of our specific reasons for joining Toastmasters, we all share one thing in common. We joined Toastmasters because we realized that Toastmasters offered programs and opportunities that could be of benefit to us. Some of us may have had specific items that we wanted to improve

The Toastmasters International 68th Annual Convention

Just because you've been to one Toastmasters International Convention, it doesn't mean you've experienced it all. This was my fifth convention, and I find that each one is a unique experience that makes me look forward to the next one.

The 68th Annual Toastmasters International Convention brought us to the Windy City of Chicago. On August 18-21, Toastmasters International celebrated its Diamond Jubilee, 75 years of success, at the Sheraton Chicago Hotel and Towers. Over 2,000 Toastmasters from around the world came to attend the convention and enjoy the dining, shopping, cultural events and breathtaking skyline of Chicago.

The convention kicked off Wednesday evening with the opening ceremonies. Two-time Olympic pole-vault champion Bob Richards gave the keynote address on "The Secrets of the Great Ones," where he cited the struggles and accomplishments of different champions. The next three days were packed with educational sessions, luncheons, dinner parties, the hall of fame, the annual business meeting, and the World Championship of Public Speaking.

There were five educational tracks: Speaking, Personal Growth, Motivation and Leadership, Club and District Success, and Professional Speaking. This year, I decided to focus on motivation and leadership, and professional speaking. I enjoyed each session I attended. Zig Ziglar was presented the 1999 Golden Gavel Award, which is Toastmasters International's highest award for excellence in communication and leadership.

Zig Ziglar had launched his full-time speaking career and built a multimillion dollar corporation based on the philosophy of hard work, common sense, fairness, integrity and commitment. How I wished my Toastmaster friends

the club taking on role responsibilities and willingly learning how to be supportive, the club would become unstable. The club is healthy when it has fully distributed support by those who are involved in the club.

How about Areas, Divisions and Districts? Can they be seen as kinds of tables, too? Each management level of Toastmasters International's organization acts as a kind of table to gather around and on which to get work done. And each table needs its support, or the tables will tip and require being set upright again before becoming useful again.

Let's talk in practical terms, then. A healthy club as well as a healthy Area, Division or District requires support all around. This means members putting attention and energy into club and Toastmasters International activities. Public speaking involves more than putting together a speech. It involves learning group dynamics and how to bring about successful events. An event may be your club meeting. It may mean an Area or Division contest.

When you think of ways to help support your club, area, division and/or district, you'll be adding your support to a stable learning environment.

Then, as you become involved in the event of a Toastmaster club meeting or activity, you'll know the comfort of sitting at the table, ready and available to speak. while others of us may have just wanted to generally build and enhance our skills. During our tenure in Toastmasters, we may have found additional programs in Toastmasters that offered opportunities for improvement.

I've seen members who give nine speeches and then stop, one short of achieving their CTM. I've seen members give speeches for which no manual credit was earned.

If a member joins Toastmasters to enrich himself, but doesn't take advantage of the Toastmasters programs, is that member keeping the commitment?

Now, I'm going to offer you a challenge. Between now and June 30, what do you want to accomplish in Toastmasters? Write it down. Write down the steps that you will need to do to accomplish the task. Write down the timetable on how the steps will be accomplished. And when you've done that, send it to me at PO Box 3043, Santa Clara, CA, 95055. It's your own personal commitment. It's your goal for the next eight months.

Just so you won't think I'm asking you to do something I wouldn't do myself, here's my commitment to you. I want to get my CL by December 31. I need to do one more presentation out of the Successful Club Series. I also want to get another CTM. That's right, folks, you can get more than one CTM, and I'm working on my fifth now. I have three speeches done. I need to do about one speech every six weeks. That's aggressive, but it can be done. It's my commitment to myself and to my club.

So, those are my goals. Please send me yours. And remember, let's all keep the commitment together.

In talking about new horizons, it refers to reaching out to greater challenges. Henceforth, the name New Horizons is to reach out and accomplish new goals.

Building Your First Club; You're Not Without Help

As a Toastmaster, building your first club can be a very rewarding endeavor. You are the one who has come up with the original idea of starting your club. You are the one that new members look to for advice and guidance. But do you know how to build a club? As the Lt. Governor of Marketing and the lead for our District Four Marketing Team, I'd like to share with you on how to go about getting your new club in the best possible way.

NEW CLUB CONTACT

As part of my duties as Lt. Governor of Marketing, I am always looking for New Club contacts. If you want to start a club, for instance, I'd like to know about it so I can steer you in the right direction.

For instance, you can ask your HR Department if you can start a club at your work place. If your company has a lunch time club, you might request starting an evening Toastmaster's club. I am told that Hewlett Packard has eight different Toastmaster clubs, so this is a good way to get started.

You can also start a club at your local restaurant or at a nearby college. When you start talking about a new club, you may even find others who want to get involved, but want a club closer to where they live or go to school. So even if these people can't help you start your club, they'd make excellent New Club contacts for our District. Since we'd like to develop a list of these con-

tacts and see how we can help you and others in starting clubs, please contact me, Tom Dennis, DTM, at (510) 490-8496 or get in touch with your Division Governor.

DEMONSTRATION MEETING

Once our District Marketing Team has been in touch with you or another New Club contact, we will then request a date and location for a demonstration meeting. We will request that the company (or community group) promote this Demonstration Meeting to all employees/members so we will have maximum attendance.

I will then contact our Club Extension Chair Joe Madley, DTM, to put together a team of experienced Toastmasters to put on a Toastmaster meeting. After the meeting, we'll explain the costs involved in getting started. After a good Demonstration Meeting, we usually have quite a few guests who will join on the spot. To officially charter a club you will need 20 members to start. By working together, we can usually get a club chartered within three meetings.

Promatch.org: Club Growth Opportunities Await

I'd like to share with you one of my recent encounters and I think it may indicate some District-wide needs suitable for the audience of The Fourcaster.

Recently, I joined a Sunnyvale-based group called Promatch, an organization helping unemployed people to get back to the work force by networking them with companies; (it's Promatch.org and not Promatch.com, which is a dating service). Promatch.org offers lot of free workshops to their members including transition management, resume writing, cover letter writing, interviews, telephone interviews, 30-sec positioning statements, PSRs, negotiation, self-marketing, creative expressions, speaking skills, financial planning, 7-habits of ..., etc. Of course, they take volunteer speakers, too (I met Rhonda Pryor and Shannen of Bravo TM there).

Being an ex-Speakers Bureau chair, I think this is a great place for your volunteer speakers to give speeches. Also, because the Promatch members are job hunters, many are interested in Toastmasters and what it has

to offer in skill development as well as personal growth.

I made quite an impression with my brief self introduction at the first general meeting of a 200+ audience and they are expecting me to host a meeting soon. My Toastmasters training does help!

Promatch can make an excellent target location for recruiting new members. Other

good places for Toastmaster recruitment are the NOVA (North Valley Private Industry Council) and SIVA (Silicon Valley) offices, EDD (Employment Development Dept) and the CAC (Career Action Center) in Cupertino. These are the places the unemployed people hang around and a lot of them can benefit from Toastmaster training.

Promatch's office is at 505 W. Olive, Suite 200, Sunnyvale CA 94086. Tel. 408-736-2391, www.promatch.org; attn. Anita Shumway (training), Kitty Wilson (marketing). It is in the same parking lot as the Sunnyvale Library (El Camino and S. Pastoria).

NOVA has the same address, but is in suite 550. EDD is in the same plaza, but in a separate building. There are other branches around the area, so best check in the phone book.

For the CAC, it is located at 10420 Bubb Rd (at Stevens Creek), Cupertino, CA 95014. Tel. 408-253-3200. CAC is in the same building as UC Extension-Santa Cruz.

I hope the above information will be of interest to all of us in District Four.

CHARTER PAPERWORK

To officially be recognized by Toastmasters International, a club will send in their Application to Organize plus a \$95.00 fee. This will result in getting an official club number as well. The club must then collect checks from the twenty charter members. There is a one time materials fee of \$17.24 + a six month prepay of Toastmasters International dues of \$18.00 per club member. Send in the checks with the charter paperwork. Within about a week, Toastmasters International will issue your Club Number.

As the starter of the club, you will be known as an official sponsor of this club. Our District Marketing Team will then assign two mentors to assist in the mentoring and building of the club.

CHARTER PARTY

Once your club is chartered, we will set a date for a charter party. The District Governor and Lt. Governor of Marketing will come to your company or community group and award the charter to the club members and recognize those members who have contributed to the building of this New Club. This will include celebrating you and your effort in starting a new Toastmasters International club!


The Credentials Desk will be open at the District Four Fall Conference for eligible voters to pick up their ballots. The hours of the Credentials Desk will be 9:00 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. - 4:00 p.m. Voting will take place at the District Council Meeting scheduled at 4:30 p.m. at the Biltmore Hotel in Santa Clara on November 22, 1999.

District Council members will vote on District Business including approval of the 1999-2000 Appointed Officers, the District Four Budget and District Calendar, and any other new or unfinished business that needs to be brought before the District Council.

District Council members include the Presidents and Vice Presidents of Education from each District Four Toastmasters club in good standing at the time of the District Council meeting and current District Four Executive Committee (District Officers) (includes District Governor; Lt. Governor of Education & Training; Lt. Governor of Marketing; Public Relations Officer; Immediate Past District Governor; Division Governors; Area Governors; District Secretary and District Treasurer).

Each President and Vice President of Education in attendance is entitled to one vote, or may designate in writing any active individual member of the club as a proxy. If one of these officers is not in attendance and has not designated another club member as a proxy, the officer or proxy in attendance shall be deemed to hold the proxy of the other and may, there-

fore, cast two votes. Proxy forms may be signed by either the President or Vice President of Education of the club and may not be assigned to Toastmasters who are not members of that club. No Toastmaster may cast more than two club votes, regardless of the number of clubs of which the Toastmaster is a member. You may use the proxy form printed below or prepare a similar one of your own.

Each District officer is entitled to one vote, which must be cast in person. Proxies are not accepted for District Officers. A District Officer may also carry up to two club votes. The maximum votes that can be carried by a District Officer is three.

If you are a club President or Vice President of Education, check in at the Credentials Desk and sign for your ballots. If you are the proxy for the President and/or Vice President of Education, present your signed proxy form to the Credentials Desk.

All Toastmasters who are planning to attend the Fall Conference: If neither the President nor Vice President of Education is attending, have them complete the proxy form for another member of the club who will be attending. Inattention to this matter will result in your club's not being able to cast its votes.

We encourage you to pick up your ballots as early as possible from the Credentials Desk.


